Lesson Aim	Distinguish God's revealed Word from our meditations, deductions, and speculative conclusions.

Key Scriptures

Matthew 4:4; 1 Corinthians 8:1-6; Deuteronomy 29:29; Psalm 119:15-16.

1. God's Word and Our Conclusions Are Not Identical

- Scripture is authoritative; our interpretations and theological conclusions are human responses to it.
- Confusing the two makes disagreement feel like rebellion against God rather than a call to re-examine our reasoning.

2. Minimizing Our Opinions

- Strongly held opinions can quietly gain the status of Scripture in our minds.
- Humility requires us to distinguish what the text plainly states from what we infer.

3. Meditation

- Biblical meditation dwells carefully on God's revealed truth, seeking understanding, worship, obedience, and delight.
- Meditation remains accountable to the text.

4. Speculation

- Speculation moves beyond what God has clearly revealed and can become increasingly confident despite decreasing biblical support.

- Speculation is especially divisive when it is treated as a necessary test of orthodoxy.

5. Handling Our Many Differences

- Distinguishing revelation from inference gives Christians room to investigate disagreements without weakening confidence in Scripture itself.
